



## PA ATTORNEY DEMOGRAPHICS Data, Trends & Observations

At the suggestion of the Pennsylvania Commission for Fairness & Justice, along with various legal community organizations, the Disciplinary Board ("Board") of the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania initiated the collection and reporting of voluntary self-identification inquiries regarding gender and race/ethnicity on attorney registration forms in 2018. This infographic showcases data from the 2024-25 reporting period, highlights trends observed over the past seven years, and provides comparisons with law school demographics, U.S. Census data, and the national lawyer population.


## TOTAL ATTORNEYS IN PA

Over the past 7 years, an average of 75,290 attorneys registered each year. The largest fluctuation in registration occurred from 2020-21 to 2021-22 (a decrease from 79,352 to 75,680).<sup>1</sup> The emerging trend is a gradual decline in attorneys.






## **RACE/ETHNICITY TRENDS**



### **RACE & ETHNICITY: INTRODUCTION**

Over the past seven years, there has been a steady decrease in the number of attorneys choosing to omit their race and/or ethnicity identification, dropping from 13.00% in 2018-19 to 6.84% in 2024-25. In contrast, the gender response rate has remained relatively stable, with an omission rate of 0.13% in 2018-19 compared to 0.05% in 2024-25. Overall, an increasing number of attorneys are voluntarily providing their gender, race, and ethnicity information to the Board.




#### Black/African-American

#### **Two or More Races/Ethnicities**













Enjuris collects and publishes demographic data on law students in PA. Below is a comparison of the most recent Enjuris data with the data reported by the Board for the same period (2023-24).








# **ATTORNEY DEMOGRAPHICS:** *PA Versus U.S. Data*
